The Mexican rebellion, commonly known as the Mexican Revolution, began in 1910 with Mexican revolutionary Francisco Madero's efforts to overthrow dictator General Jose de la Cruz Porfirio Diaz Mori. Diaz had ruled Mexico for nearly 34 years and during that time the U.S. had made significant investments in the country's oil and mining resources as well as its railroad.
