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History. Knitted garments found in Norway have been dated as far back as between 1476 and 1525. Some of the most well known sweater patterns attributed to Norwegian colorwork knitting are the Setesdal Lusekofte and the Fana Fanacofte patterns. Selbu in Sør-Trøndelag county is also well known for the Selburose pattern motif. Selbu mittens first appeared as a vertical column of two snowflakes on the front side of the mittens.

The museum was in 2012 given 150 knitted garments designed by her, among others Snøkrystall (Snowflake), Eskimo and the iconic "Marius" sweater. The latter (last one) was inspired by traditional Setesdal sweaters and was launched in the 1953 film "Troll I ord".

The Setesdal Line (Norwegian: Setesdalsbanen) is a railroad between Kristiansand and Byglandsfjord, Setesdal in southern Norway. It was opened to Hægeland in 1895, and to Byglandsfjord in 1896. This railroad was closed down in 1962 but parts of it exist today as a hobby railroad and it is in regular tourist use during the summer months.

Setesdal Sweater - One of the World's Most Knitted

The Setesdal sweater is one of the Norwegian patterns most closely identified with a particular place and tradition, and Sundbø has become the country's most respected expert in the cultural history of this design.

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Initially, only natural colors were used for sweaters, cardigans and accessories until the first two colored models were knitted in the 1920s- two evergreen classics, Setesdal and Fana. Later on, in 1953, a pattern inspired from the Setesdal one charmed the entire world: the Marius pattern.

The Lusekofte of Norway dates back to the 1800s; it is sometimes more formally called a setesdalsgenser, or sweater from the Setesdal region. The name translates as "lice jacket" after its black and white diagonal check pattern, and is always colored black, grey and white due to the use of undyed sheep wool.

Several years after I completed it, Annemor Sundbo published Setesdal Sweaters: The History of the Norwegian Lice Pattern (2001). According to Annemor, whose knitwear studio in Kristiansund Norway I hope to visit, these sweaters, also called "setesdalsgenser" (setesdal sweater) have a long history. Here is a bit of it:

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
